Dear Parishioners:

As you know, we celebrate **Veterans Day** on November 11. Veterans Day dates back to the end of World War I, the "war to end all wars". Word War I ended officially at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918. It was originally known as "Armistice Day" since the war officially ended with the signing of the treaty or armistice. The actual signing of the treaty took place 7 months later, on June 28, 1919 in Versailles, France.

In 1938, a Congressional Act made November 11th a legal holiday: "a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace and to thereafter to be celebrated and known as Armistice Day". In 1954 the name was changed to Veterans Day. In 1971, in accord with the "*Uniform Monday Holiday Act*", Veterans Day was moved to the fourth Monday in October. However, in 1978, Veterans Day was moved back to its original celebration on November 11.

In many churches, on Sunday, November 11, Veterans Day, our veterans are often asked to stand and to be acknowledged for their service to God and country. I am always very touched by the warm reception our veterans receive from our people. It is good to know that our veterans are appreciated here in our churches, synagogues and mosques. While I realize that far too many people see Veterans Day as a shopping day with special sales, I am very happy to see we do not do that at our places of worship.

Over the past few weeks (Nov 3 & 10), we celebrated the Sacrament of Confirmation for 150 9th graders (over four separate ceremonies). One of the effects of Confirmation is that a confirmed person is now an "adult witness". As a "witness", you need to know things about "the case", namely Christ and His Church. In addition, you need to testify on behalf of Christ. Being a confirmed Catholic means that you are not to remain silent about Christ and His Church; rather, you are to tell others about Christ.

Confirmation also completes the Sacraments of Initiation (along with Baptism and Eucharist). As a confirmed person, you are now eligible to be a godparent and a sponsor for Confirmation as well. And, perhaps most importantly, a confirmed person has received the fullness of the Holy Spirit, that same Holy Spirit that the candidate first received at his/her Baptism.

Remember: Together, we can do something beautiful for God.



Saint Padre Pio

The relics of Saint Padre Pio are coming to the parish the weekend of November 6-7th.

The purpose is to give us an experience of the living God through an encounter with the relics of this holy Saint. In general, the relics of the saints can bring about a renewal of the Catholic faith for many people. Fr. Brian, our pastor, and Fr. Charles will be preaching on Padre Pio at all the weekend Masses and praying the beautiful and heartfelt prayer entitled, "Stay with Me, Lord", written by Saint Padre Pio. Then, at the end of each liturgy, they will bless everyone with the relic of Saint Padré Pio. After the Masses parishioners will have an opportunity to venerate the relics. Then on Sunday afternoon, from 2:00-3:00pm, there will be an additional prayer service and veneration of the relics.

First, let's answer the questions:

- 1. Who is Padre Pio?
- 2. What are relics? Is it based in scripture?
- 3. Which relic of Padre Pio is coming to the parish?
- 4. Why do we venerate relics?

Padre Pio was born on May 25, 1887 in <u>Pietrelcina</u>, southern Italy. He was tutored privately until his entry to the novitiate of the Capuchin Friars at the age of 15. Of feeble health but strong will, with the help of grace, he completed the required studies and was ordained a priest in 1910.

On September 20, 1918 the five wounds of our Lord's passion appeared on his body, making him the first stigmatized priest in the history of the Catholic Church. The wounds were in both his hands, both feet and in his side. Countless persons were attracted to his confessional as he heard confessions for hours each day. He had the gift of reading people's souls. Many more received his saintly counsel and spiritual guidance through correspondence.

His whole life was marked by long hours of prayer and continual austerity. His letters to his spiritual directors reveal the ineffable suffering, physical and spiritual, which accompanied him all through his life. They also reveal his deep union with God, his burning love for the Blessed Eucharist and Our Blessed Lady.

On January 9, 1940, Padre Pio announced his grandiose plans to develop a Home for the Relief of Suffering (the Casa Sollievo della Sofferenza). The Casa opened its doors on May 5, 1956 as a 300 bed facility, built on the small, sincere and spontaneous donations and prayers of his followers. He also developed an international network of prayer groups for the support of the Casa and its ministry that continues to live on and grow today.

Padre Pio considered the Casa Sollievo Della Sofferenza (Casa) his "Work", inspired and blessed by God, to be a haven of relief from suffering for all of God's children in pain in body or soul. It is a model community of Catholic Christian health delivery, and has grown into a regional referral center of international renown. Today, with over 1,000 beds and services comparable to most academic research centers of excellence, the Casa is thriving by God's graces in one of the most remote, desolate and poorest areas of Italy...atop Mount Gargano, four hours from Rome.

Worn out by over half a century of intense suffering and constant apostolic activity in San Giovanni Rotondo, Padre Pio was called to his heavenly reward on September 23, 1968. After a public funeral, which attracted over 100,000 mourners, his body was entombed in the crypt of Our Lady of Grace Church. Increasing numbers flock to his tomb from all parts of the world and many testify to spiritual and temporal graces received through his intercession.

On December 18, 1997, by the reading of the decree on the heroic virtues, the Holy Father John Paul II declared Padre Pio "Venerable." and, on June 16, 2002, over 500,000 Padre Pio devotees gathered in Rome to witness <u>Pope John Paul II</u> proclaim Padre Pio, "Saint Pio of Pietrelcina".

What are Relics?

Relics are physical objects that have a direct association with the saints or with Our Lord. They are usually broken down into three classes. First class relics are the body or fragments of the body of a saint, such as pieces of bone or flesh. Second class relics are something that a saint personally owned, such as a shirt or book (or fragments of those items). Third class relics are those items that a saint touched or that have been touched to a first, second, or another third class relic of a saint.

Scripture teaches that God acts through relics, especially in terms of healing. In fact, when surveying what Scripture has to say about sacred relics, one is left with the idea that healing is what relics "do."

Scriptures:

- --- When the corpse of a man was touched to the bones of the prophet Elisha the man came back to life and rose to his feet. (2 Kings 13:20-21)
- ---A woman was healed of her hemorrhage simply by touching the hem of Jesus' cloak. (*Matthew 9:20-22*)
- --- The signs and wonders worked by the Apostles were so great that people would line the streets with the sick so that when Peter walked by at least his shadow might 'touch' them. (*Acts 5:12-15*)
- ---When handkerchiefs or aprons that had been touched to Paul were applied to the sick, the people were healed and evil spirits were driven out of them. (*Acts 19:11-12*)


In each of these instances God has brought about a healing using a material object. The vehicle for the healing was the touching of that object. It is very important to note, however, that the cause of the healing is God; the relics are a means through which He acts. In other words, relics are not magic. They do not contain a power that is their own; a power separate from God. Any good that comes about through a relic is God's doing. But the fact that God chooses to use the relics of saints to work healing and miracles tells us that He wants to draw our attention to the saints as "models and intercessors" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 828). If one is not able to touch the relic, praying before the relic and venerating it from a distance with faith in our hearts, God's blessing will come upon that person.

What is the relic coming to the parish?

The relics of Padre Pio will be brought to our church from the Philippines. It will be the glove that St. Padre Pio wore over one of his hands that had the stigmata in it. This is considered a second-class relic because Padre Pio wore it, touched it. A First-class relic of Padre Pio is also coming. This relic will be a piece of the white gauze that wrapped the hand of Padre Pio before he put the gloves on. Because the stigmata in his hand often bled the gauze will be blood stained causing this to be the first-class relic because this is something from the body of the saint.

Veneration of the relic:

As stated above, relics are our Spiritual heroes in the faith. They are men and women who have gone before us. They know what this journey of life is about and besides the fact that they kept the faith till the end of their lives, their love for God was proven by their virtuous life. Our act of veneration implores their holy intercession as well as acknowledging their fidelity and "Yes" to God throughout their life. We will be blessing everyone with the 1st class relic of St. Padre Pio after all the weekend Masses of November 6th and 7th. The relic will be on display on a table in the sanctuary between the Altar and cantor's podium. People will not be able to touch or handle the relic for concern of spreading Covid. Therefore, after each Mass parishioners will have the opportunity to stand at the base of the sanctuary step to offer their veneration from a distance. An act of veneration could be a genuflection before the relic, a bow before the relic or kneeling to say a short prayer.

Stay with me, Lord, for it is necessary to have You present so that I do not forget You. You know how easily I abandon You.

Stay with me, Lord, because I am weak and I need Your strength, that I may not fall so often.

Stay with me, Lord, for You are my life, and without You, I am without fervor.

Stay with me, Lord, for You are my light, and without You, I am in darkness.

Stay with me, Lord, to show me Your will.

Stay with me, Lord, so that I hear Your voice and follow You.

Stay with me, Lord, for I desire to love You very much, and always be in Your company.

Stay with me, Lord, if You wish me to be faithful to You.

Stay with me, Lord, for as poor as my soul is, I want it to be a place of consolation for You, a nest of love.

Stay with me, Jesus, for it is getting late and the day is coming to a close, and life passes; death, judgment, eternity approaches. It is necessary to renew my strength, so that I will not stop along the way and for that, I need You.

It is getting late and death approaches,
I fear the darkness, the temptations, the dryness, the cross, the sorrows.
O how I need You, my Jesus, in this night of exile!

Stay with me tonight, Jesus, in life with all it's dangers. I need You.

Let me recognize You as Your disciples did at the breaking of the bread, so that the Eucharistic Communion be the Light which disperses the darkness, the force which sustains me, the unique joy of my heart.

Stay with me, Lord, because at the hour of my death, I want to remain united to You, if not by communion, at least by grace and love.

Stay with me, Jesus, I do not ask for divine consolation, because I do not merit it, but the gift of Your Presence, oh yes, I ask this of You!

Stay with me, Lord, for it is You alone I look for, Your Love, Your Grace, Your Will, Your Heart, Your Spirit, because I love You and ask no other reward but to love You more and more.

With a firm love, I will love You with all my heart while on earth and continue to love You perfectly during all eternity. *Amen*

Butterfly Memory Café - November 19th from 1:30-2:30pm

What is a Memory Café? It is a program designed for persons with mild to moderate cognitive impairment and their caregiver to promote social engagement with others navigating through dementia's journey. 

Sharing the Gospel


